VIVERE DIO DALL'INTERNO

Alcuni anni fa', il grande teologo tedesco Karl Rahner, osava affermare che il principale e più urgente problema della Chiesa del nostro tempo è la sua «mediocrità spirituale». Queste erano le sue parole: Il vero problema della Chiesa è «andare avanti con una rassegnazione e una noia sempre maggiori per le vie abituali di una mediocrità spirituale».

Il problema non ha fatto che aggravarsi in queste ultime decadi. A poco sono serviti i tentativi di rafforzare le istituzioni, salvaguardare la liturgia o vigilare sull'ortodossia. Nel cuore di molti cristiani si sta spegnendo l'esperienza interiore di Dio.

Nella Chiesa si parla molto di Dio, ma dove e quando noi credenti ascoltiamo la presenza silenziosa di Dio nel più profondo del cuore? Dove e quando accogliamo lo Spirito del Risorto dentro di noi? Quando viviamo in comunione con il Mistero di Dio dall'interno?

Accogliere Dio dentro di noi vuol dire almeno due cose. La prima: non collocare sempre Dio lontano e fuori di noi, cioè imparare ad ascoltarlo nel silenzio del cuore. La seconda: far scendere Dio dalla testa al profondo del nostro essere, cioè smettere di pensare a Dio solo con la mente e imparare a percepirlo nel più intimo del nostro essere.

Questa esperienza interiore di Dio, reale e concreta, può trasformare la nostra fede. Ci si sorprende di come si è potuto vivere senza scoprirlo prima. È possibile trovare Dio all'interno di noi stessi in mezzo a una cultura secolarizzata. È anche possibile oggi conoscere una gioia interiore nuova e differente. Tuttavia mi sembra molto difficile mantenere per molto tempo la fede in Dio in mezzo all'agitazione e frivolezza della vita moderna, senza conoscere, anche se in maniera umile e semplice, qualche esperienza interiore del Mistero di Dio.

TO LIVE GOD FROM THE INSIDE

Some years ago, the great German theologian, Karl Rahner, dared to affirm that the main and most urgent problem in the church today is her «spiritual mediocrity». These were his words: the true problem of the Church is «to keep trudging on with a resignation and an ever greater tedium along the routine paths of a spiritual mediocri-

The problem hasn't done anything except get worse in these last decades. It has served us little to try to reform institutions, preserve the liturgy or keep watch over orthodoxy. In the hearts of many Christians the interior experience of God is being extinguished.

In the Church there's much talk about God, but where and when do we believers listen to the silent presence of God in the deepest depths of our heart? Where and when do we welcome the Spirit of the Resurrected One in our inner self? When do we live in communion with the Mystery of God from within?

To welcome God's Spirit within means at least two things. The first is to not keep putting God far away and outside of ourselves: we need to learn to listen to God in the silence of our hearts. The second is to get God out of our head and down into our depths; that is, to stop thinking of God only with the mind and to learn to perceive God in the most intimate part of our

This interior experience of God, something real and concrete, transforms our faith. You wonder how you could live without having discovered this before. It's possible to encounter God within us even in a secularized culture. It's also possible to know an inner joy that's new and different. It seems to me very difficult to maintain faith in God for very long in the midst of the agitation and frivolity of modern life, without knowing, albeit in a humble and simple way, some interior experience of the Mystery of God.

First Reading Acts 2:1-11 A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Second Reading 1 Cor 12:3-7, 12-13

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit. There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose. Just as a human body, though it is made up of many parts, is a single unit because all these parts, though many, make one body, so it is with Christ. In the one Spirit we were all baptised, Jews as well as Greeks, slaves as well as citizens, and one Spirit was given to us all to drink. Sequence: Holy Spirit, Lord of light, From the clear celestial height Thy pure beaming radiance give. Come, thou Father of the poor, Come with treasures which endure; Come, thou light of all that live! Thou, of all consolers best, Thou, the soul's delightful guest, Dost refreshing peace bestow; Thou in toil art comfort sweet: Pleasant coolness in the heat: Solace in the midst of woe. Light immortal, light divine, Visit thou these hearts of thine, And our inmost being fill: If thou take thy grace away, Nothing pure in man will stay; All his good is turned to ill. Heal our wounds, our strength renew; On our dryness pour thy dew; Wash the stains of guilt away: Bend the stubborn heart and will; Melt the frozen, warm the chill; Guide the steps that go astray. Thou, on us who evermore Thee confess and thee adore, With thy sevenfold gifts descend: Give us comfort when we die; Give us life with thee on high; Give us joys that never end.

UPDATE: GENERAL GUIDELINES

COVID-19 Implications for the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne

The Church is going to be open 15 minutes before the Mass. The Carpark and the Parish Hall is going to be close until the restrictions are lifted. We continue to do live-streaming masses during the weekend in English, Italian and Vietnamese.

From 11:59pm on 31 May 2020 restrictions on gatherings at places of worship and ceremonies will be eased:

Places of worship can open for private worship or small religious ceremonies for up to 20 people in a Single undivided indoor space, subject to the four square metre rule plus the minimum number of people reasonably required to perform the service or ceremony.

At a Wedding, 20 people in addition to the celebrant and couple being married can attend a wedding. If a wedding is held in a home, a maximum of 20 people is allowed, including the celebrant and the couple.

At a Funeral, 50 people can attend a funeral in addition to the officiant and funeral staff, subject to the four-square metre rule. If a funeral is held in a home, a maximum of 20 people can be present (including the officiant and funeral staff).

In General, Conditions Require:

- Clear signage around service schedules, social distancing and hygiene requirements;
- Availability of sanitiser and disinfectant wipes, and safe disposal sites;
- Churches to be cleaned after a scheduled service or opening;
- Maintenance of 1.5m of separation and planned entry and exit pathways;
- Building capacity rules must apply -1 person per 4 square metres;
- All attendees to provide contact details.

Churches are now considered as workplaces for the purposes of broadcasting or live-streaming liturgies. This permission pertains only to: While this allows for more people to be involved, churches must abide by the square metre per person rule for the capacity of the space and adhere to the 1.5m between each person distancing.
